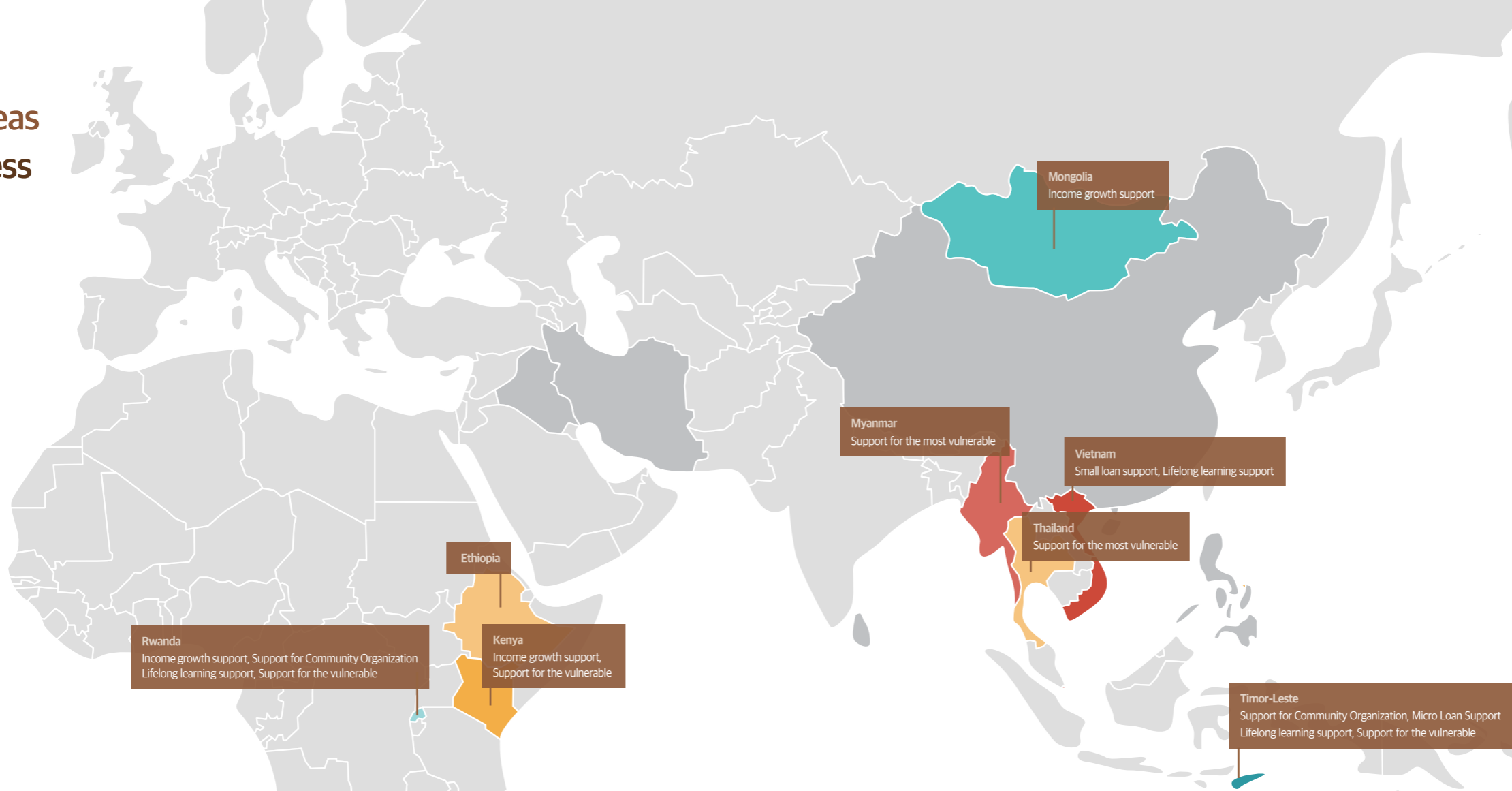

Closing the 2022 project

Our Vietnam business office, which has the longest history in the Global Civic Sharing, has very stable business capabilities worthy of its name. One of them is the livestock bank project that we have been carrying out for over 23 years. This project provides a foundation for self-reliance for poor households in the community and secures educational opportunities for their children. In 2022, thanks to the support from partner organizations and supporters, we supported the cost of purchasing cows, livestock education, and vaccination to a total of 337 households. In addition, we have installed a computer classroom for a middle school thanks to the support from the Seoul Guarantee Insurance Company and carried out short-term volunteer activities in the Daejeon Metropolitan Office of Education. We would like to express our gratitude to our partners who cooperate to improve the quality of life and guarantee the basic rights of residents.

Business Plan for 2023

The <Cow Bank>, a small loan livestock support project to break the cycle of poverty by improving the overall income level of Vietnamese farmers, is a representative project of the Global Civic Sharing. The amount of support increased from 50 cows in 2000 to an average of 200 to 250 cows in 2016, and the reimbursement rate reached 97%. In 2023, we will continue to put our effort into managing and operating the existing cow banks in close cooperation with local residents to contribute to alleviating the poverty among farmers by reflecting the demand in the region. Also, we plan to carry out the computer classroom project, which local public officials and parents request with great interest, and an education and sanitary project that improves the educational and sanitary environment in the residential areas of poor minorities.

We are also preparing for the disability support program, which the Vietnamese business office has been carrying out with expertise for a long time.

The Mongolian office has carried out activities such as artificial insemination of excellent dairy cows and support equipment, such as milking machines, to improve the productivity of livestock farmers through the <Livestock Producer Added Value Enhancement Project for the Development of Inclusive Livestock Industry in Mongolia>. At the same time, we have carried out activities such as creating joint farms for the supply of feed, which is difficult for a single livestock farmer to handle, the expansion of a dairy production plant, and the support of equipment and materials. Besides such direct support, we tried to reinforce the capacity of residents through various projects such as organizing cooperative organizations, providing education, and carrying out policy improvement council activities.

Business Plan for 2023

Following 2022, the Mongolia office plans to grow the income of livestock farmers through projects such as artificial insemination, support for equipment, and operation of joint farms and dairy processing factories. In addition, for the strengthening of the livestock value chain, we will reinforce the producer-SME network and develop livestock policies through the Livestock Policy Council. Lastly, this year, we will strive to increase the capacity of livestock producers through the livestock training to be conducted in the Livestock Leader Education Center that plans to be completed this year.

Closing the 2022 project

2022 has been a year that we could get closer to the lives of residents. In particular, with the lifting of the state emergency in Timor-Leste in March 2022, people-to-people and country-to-country travel was gradually resumed, and field activities of overseas volunteers restarted. Thanks to this, we were able to recheck contracted activities and listen more closely to the voices of the residents to solidify our foundation. We have conducted various field surveys to understand the problems of the areas from the perspective of the residents and to identify the available resources. In addition, at the end of the year, we gathered the supporting hearts of many sponsors and provided school supplies to encourage and promote basic education for children from underprivileged families in the region. Please support Timor-Leste's spring, preparing for a powerful leap after a long winter.

Business Plan for 2023

We will plan major activities based on the results of the resident survey. In particular, we are planning to promote activities that can be carried out through resident education and solidarity with residents by reflecting the residents' demand for basic education tailored to the development stage of infants and toddlers in line with the characteristics of the region where most households have multiple children. Also, we plan to help with maintenance in places where labor is needed in the village together with the volunteer group, understand each other more deeply and share our hearts through cultural exchange. Although coming 2023 is filled with many new challenges, we will carry them out step by step with the residents. Please look forward to Timor-Leste's new step forward.

In 2022, Myanmar's banking business, which had been suspended due to a coup, was resumed, and we were able to successfully transfer the full amount of 2019 loan repayment and interest accrued from KOICA's <Myanmar Small Farmers' Self-Reliance Capacity Building Project>. However, since the situation in Myanmar did not improve, it was hard to carry out new projects. We hope that Myanmar passes through the dark period and can dream once again for a brighter future. And we hope that many people will join the Global Civic Village Sharing.

Currently, the military is in power in Myanmar, and it is impossible to proceed with a new project. Instead, we are planning to promote emergency relief projects that can directly help residents in a short period of time for 2023. In particular, we are seeking ways to support and carry out emergency refugee support programs that can provide safe shelter and education as residents become refugees away from their villages and face difficulties in studying due to COVID-19 and the Myanmar crisis.

Closing the 2022 project

2022 has never been an easy year in carrying out our projects in the danger of the Myanmar military coup and COVID-19 that has continued since last year. Nonetheless, the Thai office successfully completed the reconstruction of refugee schools, the strengthening of youth capacity, and the operation of online workshops for teachers in the first half of 2022, which had been carried out since 2021. Also, in the second half of 2022, we spent a lot of time preparing for the 2023 projects by planning a project to promote social participation within their region and community and conducting basic surveys for it.

Business Plan for 2023

We have secured a budget for projects we have been planning and preparing for young immigrants since last year, and a financial foundation was established to carry out planned projects. We will do our best to make it run smoothly. Currently, the Myanmar military still dominates national power and controls society, and the struggle for democracy continues. We don't know when this situation will end, but one positive change is that the Thailand-Myanmar official border, which was closed shut, has been opened. Even if it is not right now, I hope that in the near future, we will be able to restart the project related to the resettlement of migrants in Myanmar we once carried out.

In preparation for possible riots or unrest after Kenya's general election in 2022, we started our project early on in the first half of the year. Despite our concerns, we are very glad that the election ended peacefully without major incidents. As the policy for motorcycle drivers was discussed as part of the presidential election pledge, many drivers were involved in the campaign. As a result, the participation of young drivers who were joining the ongoing project began to decline. However, once the election ended peacefully and the Kenyan economy was normalized in the second half of 2022, participation rose again. Also, while carrying out the disabled children support program we independently discovered and planned, our Kenya office employees experienced the joy of finding and supporting places in the community that are in need of help.

Closing the 2022 project

In 2022, Kenya faced a big change through the general election. Since the security situation in Kenya can be flipped over due to the election, we, the Global Civic Sharing, had a busy year carrying out projects before the general election period. The fact that the newly elected Kenya President William Ruto is from Eldoret, where the local office is located, had a great impact on our project schedule, but as the policies for motorcyclists and taxi drivers were mentioned as a presidential election pledge, we realized that the <Organize drivers and empowerment to improve motorcycle and taxi drivers of youth in Uasin Gishu County, Bodaa Salama>, a project the Global Civic Sharing Kenya Office is carrying out, is well aware of the difficulties of the Kenyan community and effectively improving them. Furthermore, we found children with disabilities who cannot receive school education due to poor facilities and lack of transportation in the region, renovated school facilities, and provided mobility aids, such as wheelchairs and school buses, to guarantee their right to education.

Business Plan for 2023

In 2023, the <Bodaa Salama> business celebrated its third year. Since we are in the stage of completing one cycle of the project, we plan to register self-help groups of motorcycle drivers who have strengthened their capabilities so far in the form of an allied union to develop greater economic and social influence, establishing a foundation to increase income by cooperating with various partners. We will model the existing project and prepare it as educational and business contents so that we can apply it to groups with the same needs in other regions. Through this, we hope this can contribute to policy and cultural changes through collaboration with local governments and businesses. Furthermore, we hope that we can connect the difficulties of the local community with the demand of the market in the existing framework of the project to create a virtuous cycle of generating income for the underprivileged and coexisting with customers.

Closing the 2022 project

As the old saying goes, 'after a storm comes a calm'; we were able to take a step closer to the goal of 'sustainable self-reliance' thanks to the employees who took the initiative in leading field-oriented projects and the residents who protected each other after the global crisis. Also, through activities such as constructing a Cassava processing plant and creating a joint farm of cooperative society, we have laid the foundation for true self-reliance where the resident organization leads the development of the local community. We could continue saving and lending business even in the face of an infectious disease or bad weather by introducing mobile savings, and the self-help groups which can operate on their own without external support were able to stand on their own feet through graduation ceremonies.

In particular, we had a lot to consider on how to set the main goals of the education project as the <Dream Library> project is turning from its 2nd year to the 3rd year. We believe that if we put children participating in this project at the center and consider what adults they should grow into and go forward step by step, children can walk into the future, leaving joyful footsteps behind. Currently, we are carrying out a project for 80 children in Nyarubaka to read books together and develop their thoughts, and with the help of many supporters, we were able to support meals to a total of 420 children in local elementary and middle schools.

Business Plan for 2023

We will continue activities centered on learning and challenges so that members can adapt to the operation of the Cassava processing plant and make good use of it. These include supplying climate change response crops, agricultural education, self-help group operation support and graduation, and the spread of mobile savings. In particular, the full-fledged operation of a Cassava processing plant makes farmers who only had experience selling their crops unprocessed experience every stage of the value chain from production to sales, including the economy of scale, creation of added value through processing, and establishment of supply plan tailored to market demand, laying a solid foundation for income increase centered on the region and residents. The biggest plan is to record the trail of children in the Dream Library. We are developing activity sheets so that children can leave their activities in class into a book, and now making children growth assessment sheets that can record their growth. In addition, we are providing opportunities for them to learn phonics so that they can become familiar with the English they will encounter in the older grades. Through the activities in the Dream Library, children will learn the joy of learning and how to study on their own and how to express themselves in various ways. We plan to operate empowerment programs and online workshops for the teachers who are on the journey together can grow together.

Laos

Laos is a country where agriculture makes up a large portion of the national economy, with 67% of the population residing in rural areas. The Lao government is also making efforts to establish agricultural development strategies and achieve development goals, enough to describe agriculture as 'the most important battlefield'. The ongoing 'Two rural development project integrated project management in Laos' is carrying out two major tasks in line with the Laos government's interest in agricultural and rural development. One is the establishment of specific implementation strategies for the agricultural development strategy of Laos, and the other is the man-

agement of agricultural development projects conducted in mid-northern and southern Laos. As direct rural development projects in Laos are carried out more effectively, with the lessons we learned from this and Korea's development experience, we would like to derive agricultural development implementation strategy that meets the national agricultural development strategy of Laos and is suitable for the local environment. Our ultimate goal is to lay the foundation for the comprehensive development of rural areas in Laos.

With our experience in rural development projects in many developing countries, the Global Civic Sharing composed a consortium with Biodiv Co., Ltd. for agricultural and rural development in Laos. We will promote the development of the agriculture industry in Laos through this project in cooperation with local agricultural government agencies and Korean experts.

*Biodiv Co., Ltd. - A corporate specialized in agricultural production and distribution environments in developing countries based on their experience in carrying out international agricultural development projects and policy research & consulting experience.

In 2022, Laos and our project were in the process of setting out plants. We planted roots firm enough to overcome any difficulties in the future as we pass through the end of the pandemic and with Corona. Despite the difficulties of the quarantine process when entering the country and insufficient flights, experts from both countries met in Laos to discuss goals and set the direction of the project in order to establish an agricultural development strategy. Now, all we have to do is nurture the sprouts that have been sprouted in the midst of a great crisis. We will do our best to harvest golden rice-like achievements and development at the end of 2025, when the project ends, and continue active cooperation between Laos and Korea in 2023.

Closing the 2022 project

This project, aiming to improve on-site performance and establish a strategy through joint research between local and Korean experts, suffered many difficulties due to COVID-19. The pandemic situation was a big drag not only for entering and leaving Laos, but also for meeting and discussing with experts scattered around the world. Even though the face-to-face meeting was difficult, we had a monthly online meeting to organize our project direction and report in the field, increasing mutual understanding of the role of PMC and rural support projects to be carried out in central and southern Laos. Korean experts visited Laos and toured the project areas to find out and prepare what would be necessary for Laos agricultural strategy establishment consulting, and identify local business conditions. We have constructed a working group to establish detailed implementation strategies of agricultural development strategies and discussed the direction of collaboration with local agencies, including the Laos Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry, Rural Development Administration, and Socioeconomic Policy Institution.

Business Plan for 2023

We plan to implement the project direction we have laid the groundwork for in 2022. In establishing a rural strategy for agriculture in Laos, we will sign business agreements with local partners and organize a working group composed of local and Korean experts to research specific agricultural strategies needed locally. In addition, we will consult on various pilot projects and training projects that are being implemented for the development of local agriculture so that they can produce more effective results.

The working group to establish Laos agricultural strategies will enable agricultural experts in various fields to exchange their accumulated knowledge and technologies between Korea and Laos online, and put its effort into practically applying the research results in the field as national policies through the implementation strategy establishment committee.

Thailand

We are currently carrying out the <Making Safe School through School Violence Prevention Education in Thailand> project that supports clubs and student self-reliance activities to create a sound school culture and safe education environment in Thailand with Samsung Life Insurance and Life Insurance Social Contribution Committee.

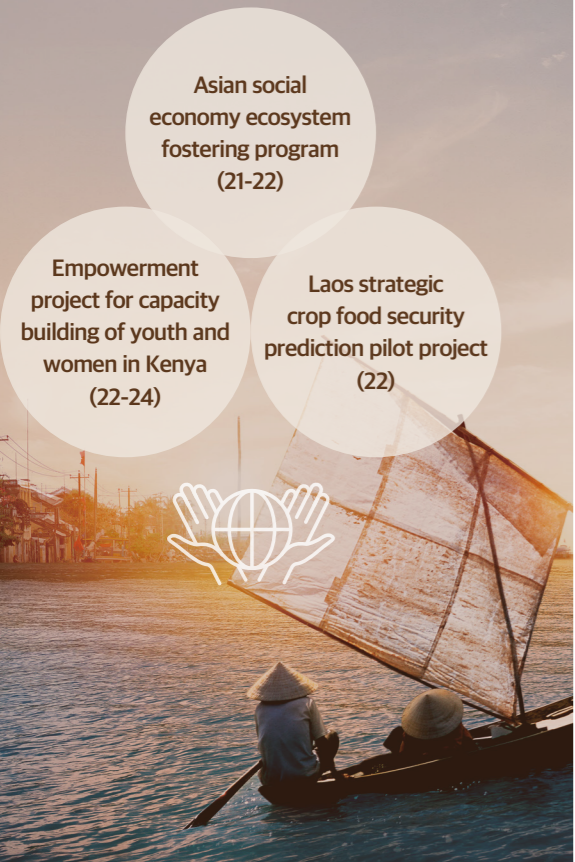
Major activities of our project, including camps and school violence prevention education, which used to be in-person activities, have been shifted to online. During online classes, a new type of school violence, such as cyberbullying, has emerged as a social problem, so we have amended our school violence prevention education curriculum so that students can perceive and recognize discrimination and insult happening in virtual space as violence and be vigilant against them. As such, we strived to create a safe online educational environment, and after all students started attending school in person, we held a contest against school clubs and student groups for student campaigns to prevent violence. We received various ideas, such as parades and video and photo contests, and we supported student-led violence prevention activities through project subsidies so that they could realize feasible proposals.

○ Business Plan for 2023 ○

We analyzed and shared the result of our project with the Thai Ministry of Education and teachers of participating schools to secure the sustainability of the activities even after the project is over, such as establishing a manual for preventing violence and responding to it when it occurs, and urging policies through understanding the actual situation. All activities in the project are for practical change in students' awareness and behavior. We will do our best to create a safe and enjoyable education environment by fully focusing on monitoring and supporting students' activities to be realized in schools suggested by students.

Policy

The Global Civic Sharing strengthens expertise through expert networking, training, forums, and solidarity activities, and strengthens the capabilities of civil society experts around the world through global knowledge-sharing activities. In 2022, we conducted various training programs for practitioners, experts, and government officials in various fields in the Philippines, Kenya, and Laos.

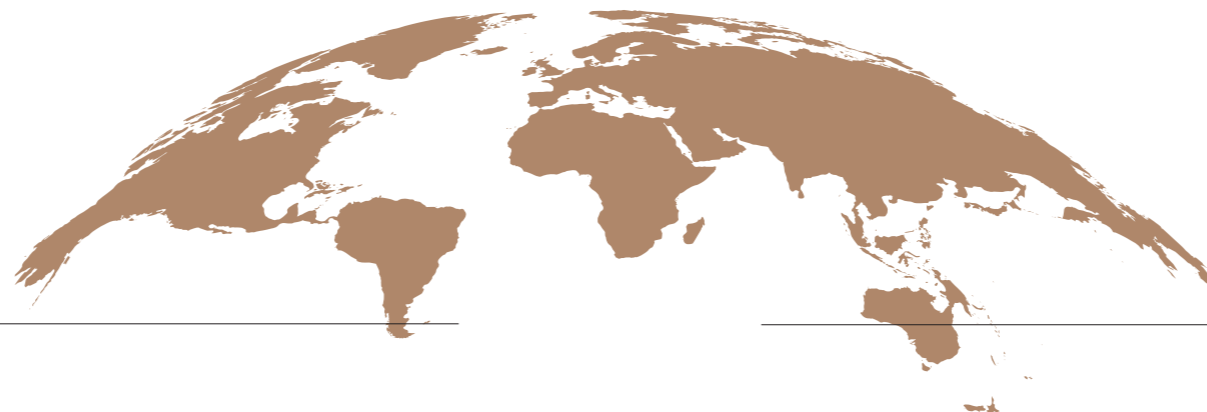

Philippines

Despite the short training period, <Pilot Project for Establishing a Registration System for Social and Solidarity Economy Companies and Groups in the Region>, which was created by government officials, foundations, and trainees from research institutes, <Agenda Formation Project to Establish Solidarity for Social and Solidarity Economy in the Philippines> written mainly by trainees from the previous year, <Pilot Project to Strengthen the Capacity of Small Businesses>, which was created by civic society, all made a huge achievement of completing project proposals necessary for their individual fields. I would like to express my gratitude to the trainees who worked hard together and made meaningful results.

Kenya

As this was the first year to start training in Kenya, 20 working-level officials in the field of vocational training diagnosed current problems with experts in vocational training and education in Korea and sought future directions. During the training period, we established an Action Plan related to the policies, systems, and empowerment of teachers that can be implemented at the working level, and we achieved the result that the trainees scored its on-the-job usefulness 100 points out of 100.

Laos

The Korean government supports advanced groundwork on the food security response system through a strategic crop production prediction model utilization project as a third-stage cooperative project of the 'ASEAN+3 Food Security Informa-

tion System(AFSIS) cooperative project(stage 1-2), for six ASEAN countries. Accordingly, we conducted customized invitation training linked to ICT human resource development projects for public officials in the field of food security and agricultural statistics and the AFSIS Secretariat. Subsequently, we have conducted on-site training focusing on system practice for relevant public officials who will directly operate the system in Laos, enabling the successful settlement of yield prediction technology.

Philippines

The official schedules of training activities developing agenda to form a socioeconomic ecosystem within the Philippines to construct a public-private partnership promotion system for realizing social values were all completed by the end of 2022. However, we will continue to support post-meetings and seek business opportunities together so that the ideas of the trainees can be realized.

Kenya

We plan to promote invited training in Korea for high-ranking and middle-level officials in the vocational training field in Kakamega in 2023. Through on-site visits to institutions related to vocational training in Korea and expert lectures, we would like to have an opportunity to review policies and directions in vocational training to empower the Kenyan youth and women and to establish an action plan.

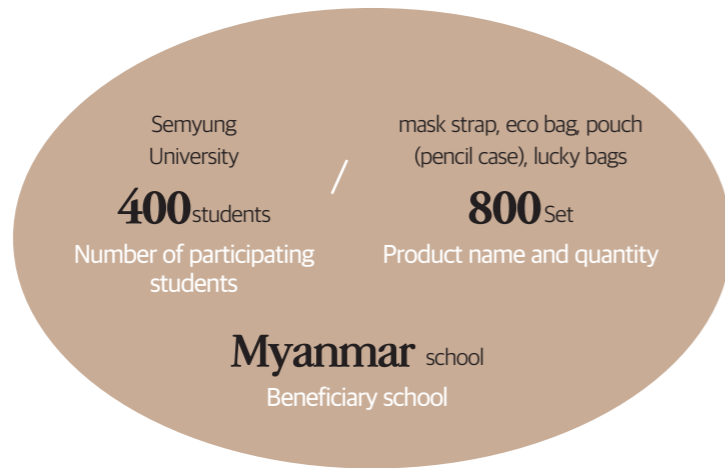

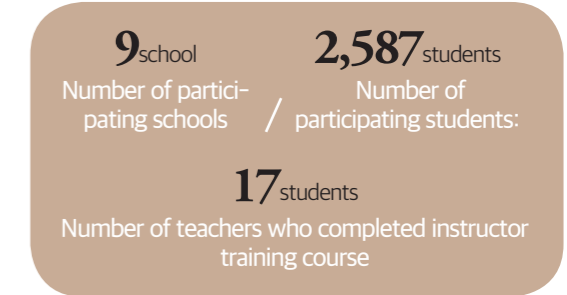

Global Village Civic School

As an educational project to foster global citizenship among our youth, we conducted global citizenship education for youth in cooperation with public education schools. Major activities include creating a guidebook for facilitators to draw specific action tasks for global change, conducting a global citizenship school for teenagers in Namyangju, Gyeonggi-do, and conducting workshops for fostering instructors focusing on teachers for the sustainability of global citizenship education in schools. In addition, we looked back on the meaning of global citizenship education from the perspective of international development cooperation and conducted career exploration activities in this field.

This is a guidebook for the host of global citizenship education for youth targeting middle and high school students. The presenter can adjust the level of difficulty according to the level of understanding of the participants, and it consists of four topics: human rights, fair trade, climate change and environment, and international development cooperation.

It is a volunteer group activity to strengthen capabilities in the field of development cooperation and to solve problems in partner countries under the theme of ESG (Environment, Social, Governance) through online overseas volunteering in the era of COVID-19 through participation in overseas volunteering by the youth. Among them, the Global Civic Sharing carried out activities in the field of governance, selected 65 Korean and 65 local youths to form teams, and constructed the Mekong Youth Council. 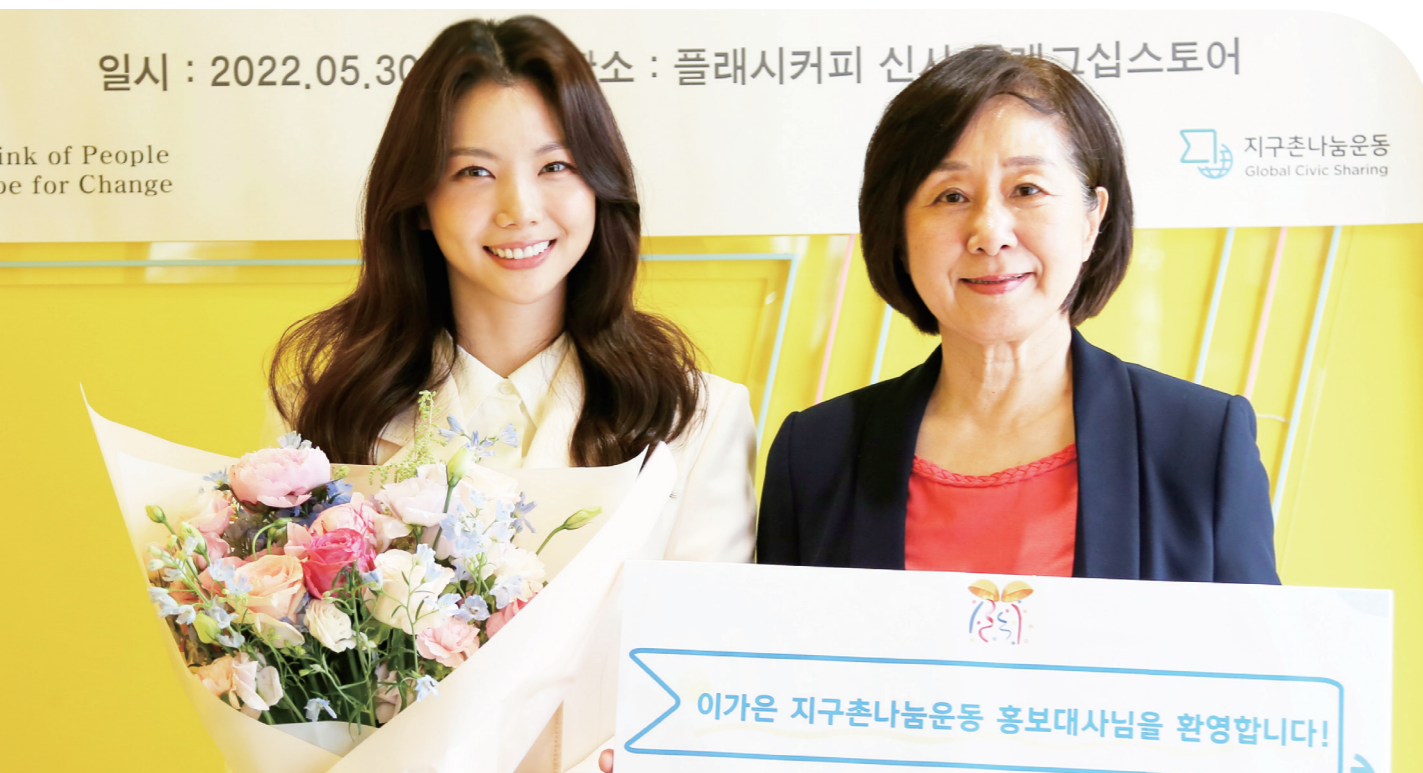

'Mongolia in the Summer!'

An endless meadow with blue sky and clear sunlight. Mongolia's summer, when livestock milk gets plentiful, is much more beautiful than summer in other countries. Now there is an opportunity for many people to watch the summer in Mongolia with their own eyes. Jo Hyun-joo, a secretary general of the Global Civic Sharing, has appeared as a program host of the Mongolian episode of EBS <World Theme Travel>. In this episode, we will show the vast nature of Mongolia and introduce 'Jargalland,' a rural village near Ulaanbaatar, where the Global Civic Sharing has been carrying out its project to develop livestock farming for 20 years. Here, you can also appreciate the nomadic life of living with various livestock. The Mongolia episode consists of a total of 4 parts and can be seen again on the official website of EBS <World Theme Travel>, YouTube, and Netflix. The land of nomadic traditions, Ulaanbaatar and all the blue lakes in the world, Khovsgol and the lifeline of life across the grasslands, Orkhon and the windy climax of life on the sand, are all introduced by Secretary General Jo Hyun-joo. Now meet the affluent summer of Mongolia.



Essay of Park Euljong, an expert committeeman



Park Euljong joined the member of the Global Civic Sharing as the project committeeman in 2000. He has been working as an auditor of the Global Civic Sharing from 2007 to 2009, and now as an expert committeeman since 2015, providing sincere advice and encouragement to our organization. We met Park Euljong and asked him how he came to be involved with the Global Civic Sharing, what he is doing, his future plan, and his thoughts.



Q I heard that you have a long relationship with the Global Civic Sharing. Can you share with us what that is?

I got to know the Global Civic Sharing since April 2000. I got a call from Professor Kim Hyeong-sik of the Department of Child Welfare at Chung-Ang University asking us to do a prosthetic/assist support project in Indochina together, and I then learned about an international development NGO called the Global Civic Sharing. Since Professor Kim used to serve as chairman of policy when I was the Secretary-General of Korea Differently Abled Federation, so we knew each other. As a war orphan, he lost his arm during the Korean War and had to wear a prosthetic arm, so he was very interested in welfare for the disabled and prosthetic aids. He told me that he decided to support prosthetic and assistive devices for people with disabilities due to landmines in Cambodia and war in Vietnam with the Global Civic Sharing and then asked me to join. Since I was also very interested in this field, I readily accepted the offer and immediately flew to Cambodia and Vietnam. There, I investigated the status of disability and support, planned a prosthetic/assistant project in Indochina, and secured financial resources to carry out the project.

A few years later, in 2005, I heard that Choi Eui-gyo, director of the Global Civic Sharing Vietnam Office, received a request to build a rehabilitation center for the disabled in Ha Tay Province, so I went to Vietnam again and did the on-site survey and met relevant officials, and discussed it. As a result, the Vietnamese government decided to provide land to build a center. When I established the basic plan, we needed a budget of about 1 billion won. While contemplating a fundraising plan to secure financial resources, I proposed it to the Community Chest of Korea and received support. From this, I served as a project committee member and auditor in the Global Civic Sharing. After that, in 2009, I was appointed as the Secretary-General of the Community Chest of Korea and had to step down from all positions in related organizations, so I was unable to participate directly in the Global Civic Sharing for a while.

However, in 2015, while establishing 'GCS VISION 2030', I was able to participate in the GCS Vision Committee as an external expert, get involved in the Global Civic Sharing again, and serve as an expert committeeman.

Q What did you do before you joined the Global Civic Sharing?

I have been working in the social welfare field for many years. Since I started my first job in 1984 through the first public recruitment of the Seoul Paralympic Organization Committee for the 1988 Paralympic Games, I served as the head of the planning department and then the general manager of the event operation. Then, I served as head of the R&D department of the Korea Disabled People's Development Institute, a successor organization, and Secretary-General of Korea Differently Abled Federation, working in the field of disability welfare for a long time. Afterward, I served as the director of the Seongnae Social Welfare Center and the secretary general of the Community Chest of Korea. Right before my retirement, I worked as a professor in the Department of Social Welfare at Hanyang Cyber University and the director of the Seongsu Social Welfare Center operated by the school for 10 years. At school, I opened a course called 'International Social Welfare Theory'.

Q What is the new Project Planning Headquarters doing, and what are your future plans as an expert committee member?

The newly established Project Planning Headquarters consists of three departments: Public Relations and Fundraising Team, Development Education Team, and Management Support Team. I would like to help with the organization stabilization and continuous development of the Global Civic Sharing with my long experience in planning, administration, and group management and my knowledge on organization management. The Global Civic Sharing is a mid-sized development NGO that has been 25 years and is a sound and exemplary organization that has carried out various international cooperation projects. It has abundant human resources and has accumulated many achievements. However, as it has been promoting too diverse projects, there is no representative business

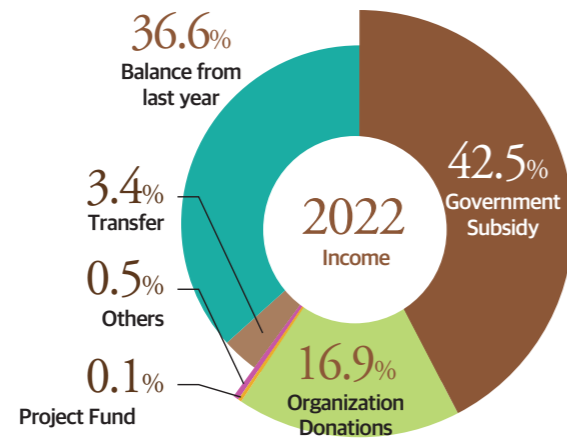
model for its long history, and public awareness is low, so it has low publicity and lacks participation in fundraising. Due to frequent turnover, the linkage of work expertise is insufficient, and the administrative system is outdated. What I should do as the general manager, is to improve these. Chairman Kim Hye-kyung emphasized 'professionalism, localization, and securing mobility' among the activities of the Global Civic Sharing. One step forward from this, I hope that our organization will become a platform for international development cooperation and the center of the network. To this end, what I should do is systematize the administrative system, and ensure stable operation and sustainable development of the organization through financial independence and these are my future plan. 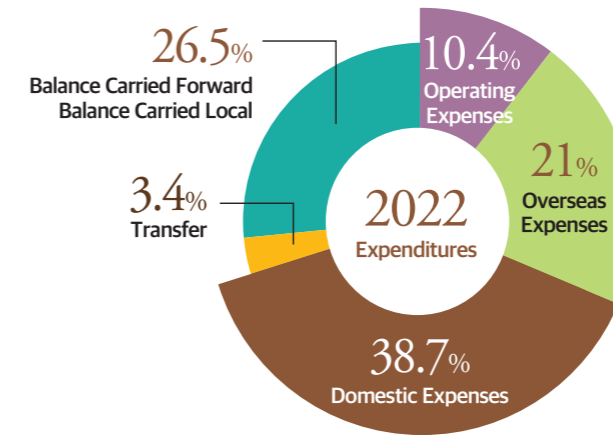
